



5. Jacobs is an exceptionally fine late medieval house, and is chiefly notable for its Tudor stair tower. The house is, however, only the best of a number of fine medieval properties in this part of Brightlingsea.



6. The narrowest part of the High Street contains some substantial commercial properties, notably the fine shop fronts in the centre of the photograph which were unfortunately empty at the time of survey. Fascia details of a more traditional character would enhance the quality of the building at the near corner.



7. The western end of the High Street continues its commercial character, though the small front garden of Ye Olde Swan makes a pleasing contrast. As with most of the Area, the buildings have a strong family relationship which adds to its consistency.



8. The War Memorial in the centre of Victoria Place. This, the most formal space in the town, is defined by its commercial frontages and the prominent spire of St James' Church. Traffic demands have led to a high proportion of this area being given over to circulation and parking.
